### **GEOLOCATION SUPER TOOL**

OpenStreetMap was created by Bellingcat and is a tool that allows proximity queries, enabling users to search OpenStreetMap data based on distances and angles. It's primarily used for finding geolocation leads and aids in identifying locations depicted in images.

Geolocation Spy (GeoSpy) focuses on OSINT analysis, providing users with tools to collect intelligence from publicly available sources. The tool supports real-time tracking, allowing users to monitor and track targets during social engineering attacks. GeoSpy also includes geospatial intelligence features, aiding in the identification of the geographical location of a target. The article linked, provides a comprehensive exploration of the integration between GeoSpy and OpenStreet Map presenting a powerful toolkit for

between GeoSpy and OpenStreetMap, presenting a powerful toolkit for advanced geospatial searches. It aims to show users to enhance their search capabilities by leveraging the unique features of both GeoSpy and OpenStreetMap.

Having tested this tool on Chinese imagery; we found that the coverage is not as good as other countries. We are hopeful that with advancing technology it will eventually bridge the gap with limited access around China.
